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COMPREHENSIVE EXAMS: Non-thesis students must take three written comprehensive exams on statistics, research methods, and sociological theories in their final semester. They must inform the sociology graduate advisor of their intention to take comprehensive exams before the second week of the semester in which they take the exams. Consult with the resources on the Canvas site about comprehensive exams. Starting in **fall 2019**, students who have ONLY comprehensive exams to complete and who have completed all coursework will be required to take GC 5100, a one-hour comprehensive exam course. This is not a course that meets and it does not affect GPA; it simply allows students to access campus resources during their final semester. Because the course is one-hour, it will not be eligible for financial aid. Students in this situation will have to pay out of pocket for the one-hour course. Hence, if possible, we recommend that students complete their comp exams during their last semester of coursework

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQS)

How can I find a list of available courses? And how do I register? The schedules of classes is posted under "University Registrar" (see https://ssb.txstate.edu/prod/bwckschd.p_disp_dyn_sched). TO REGISTER: Register via CATSWEB. Find courses in the schedule of classes. Search for Sociology courses (or, for courses outside the major, use that search term), and graduate courses. Graduate courses are 5000 level and above. Undergraduate courses will not count towards your degree.

What if I get a registration error or restriction? Some of your graduate courses require departmental approval. You must contact the appropriate graduate advisor with your student ID, name of course, and the CRN (5 digit course code) of the course you want to take. Get department approval on your courses well before registration opens. Department approvals do not guarantee you a space in the class; it simply allows you to register for the class. Do NOT delay registration because some courses (particularly required courses) fill up very fast. Register as soon as registration opens. Departmental approvals are given in the order they are received.

What courses should I take first? Try to take as many core (required) courses as possible in your first two semesters. However, avoid taking three core courses in one semester.

How many classes should I take? Full-time course loads are 9-10 hours at the graduate level. Do not take a full course load if you are working full-time. Full-time workers should take 3 or 6 hours (1 or 2 classes).

Are there any online course options? We have very few online graduate courses in our department. We have an MS in Dementia and Aging Studies, which is fully online. Sociology and Applied Sociology students may take some of the MSDA online courses IF they become available (typically a few weeks after the first day of registration) but they usually are filled with MSDA majors.

Can I take classes over the summer? Our department currently does not offer many sociology graduate courses during the summer. The summer is a great time to take courses in your minor or for your cognate (if available), develop a class paper into a conference paper, and/or read for your thesis (MA).

I'm interested in taking courses that are not listed on the degree template, will financial aid cover these? Financial aid **will not** provide funds for classes that are not a part of the degree plan. Ask us if you are unsure and before contacting financial aid.

Where can I learn more about the program and my degree? Read the handbook and check CANVAS for updates. New students should read the handout that provides information for new students.

What if I was admitted conditionally? If you were admitted **conditionally** and must take leveling courses, then you must contact us about creating SOCI 5300 courses for you.
