Eddie Durham Lesson Plan – High School Social Studies

Objectives:

- 1. Identify how Texans such as Eddie Durham contributed to the success of jazz music in America.
- 2. Understand the contributions of African-Americans to a distinctly American art form.
- 3. Understand the importance of the jazz and big band swing eras in US History.

Description:

Jazz is often not considered to be one of the most important parts of Texas music. In this lesson, students see how cultures develop and share their musical identities, and discover that one of the unsung heroes of this important art form is a Texan.

Procedure:

- 1. Play the video "Eddie Durham Ambassador of Texas Jazz"
- 2. Break the students into groups and have them discuss and write down a definition of "Texas Jazz."
- 3. Ask each student to write a paragraph evaluating Eddie Durham's importance to music in general.
